New Leader Training

The Basic Leader Training program is the culmination of more than two years of work, by professionals and volunteers from throughout the nation, which revised and updated volunteer leader training materials for the Boy Scouts of America. The result is a seamless training program that helps leaders graduate through the courses quickly and easily with little duplication. The package begins with the Fast Start training, continues through New Leader Essentials, and is followed by Leader Specific training for each adult's role in the unit. Here is a brief overview of the components of the training continuum.

Fast Start Training

Fast Start training is the first step for any new volunteer and is delivered immediately after a new leader registers, before he or she meets with any youth member. Basic Leader Training

The new Basic Leader Training comprises two parts: New Leader Essentials for all unit-level leaders and Leader Specific Training, which is based on the leader's unit-level position.

Leader-Specific Training

These training courses include leader specific training for Cub Scout, Boy Scout, Varsity and Venturing leaders; Outdoor Leader Training for Webelos Leaders; Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills for Scoutmasters/Asst Scoutmasters/Varsity Leaders.

Advanced Leader Training

Wood Badge for the 21st Century for all Leaders; Powder Horn for Venturing leaders and Boy Scout Leaders.

Continuing Education

Monthly Roundtables; Pow Wow for Cub Scout Leaders; Show and Do for Boy Scout, Varsity, and Venturing Leaders; Youth Protection and Health & Safety for all leaders.

What Makes a Trained Leader?

Cub Scout leaders are considered trained when they have completed New Leader Essentials and the Cub Scout Leader Specific training for their position.

Scoutmasters/Assistant Scoutmasters are considered trained when they have completed New Leader Essentials, Scoutmaster and Assistant Scoutmaster Leader Specific Training, and Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills.

Troop committee members are considered trained when they have completed New Leader Essentials and the Troop Committee Challenge.

Varsity Scout leaders and assistants are considered trained when they have completed New Leader Essentials, Varsity Scout Leader Specific Training, and Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills.

Venturing Crew Advisors, Associate Advisors, and Committee members are considered trained when they have completed New Leader Essentials and Venturing Leader Specific Training.
